### **Report on Churches Joining the Covenant**

The mission of the Covenant is stronger, richer, and more diverse because of the 12 churches joining this year. Each of these churches brings with them a ministry that will enrich the kingdom contribution of the whole Covenant denomination, and each church will be enriched by its connection with the Covenant. Following is a synopsis of each congregation. Each story testifies to both the handiwork of God in raising up a ministry and the faithfulness of committed people in carrying out that ministry. What is less visible is the role that every Covenanter has had in these stories. Through making possible the elements of a pastoral assessment process, financial support, training, and strategic services, every Covenanter has a place in these stories.

### Pacific Northwest Conference

**Iglesia Esperanza Viva**  
**Kent, WA**

Average Attendance: 130

**Pastor: Rev. Esau Del Arca**

In 2014, a Spanish-speaking ministry within a local church in King County stepped out in faith to plant Iglesia Esperanza Viva (Living Hope Church). This initial step took place without affiliation with a denomination. After outgrowing their initial meeting space, the search began for a more accessible meeting place for the young, but growing church. That was when the leadership connected with a staff member at Kent Covenant Church and initiated the process of partnering to use the facilities for weekly services. Through this partnership, Iglesia Esperanza Viva became acquainted with the Evangelical Covenant Church. After becoming familiar with the Covenant and their vision and support for diverse ministries, the church began the process of becoming part of the ECC. Iglesia Esperanza Viva continues to hold services at Kent Covenant's facilities to date.

**Communitas Evangelical Covenant Church**  
**Spokane, WA**

Average Attendance: 165

**Pastor: Rev. Asher Ernst**

In the Fall of 2011, Communitas was started as an evening "church within a church" at a historic PCUSA church in downtown Spokane. From the beginning of the church within a church experiment, they had a long-term goal of planting. After five years as an evening service of First Presbyterian Church, Communitas planted in early 2017 with about 45 adults and 20 kids. Once planted, they began looking for a denominational fit that embraced both a desire for rigorous discipleship and biblical justice in a relational oriented setting. Communitas knew they had

found a perfect fit when they met the Covenant. They were initially introduced to the ECC by Immanuel Covenant Church in Spokane, when Immanuel got Communitas connected with the PacNW staff who were gracious to offer the church coaching in planting. Communitas now meets at Central Lutheran Church in downtown Spokane in the mornings, they have roughly doubled in size in the last year to around 120 adults and 45 kids, and have a strong ministry toward refugees. This includes an afterschool homework club for English Language Learners and a partnership with World Relief.

### **Pacific Southwest Conference**

**Iglesia Cristiana Shalom-Elohim  
Petaluma, CA**

Average Attendance: 142

**Pastor: Edwin Guzman**

Iglesia Cristiana Shalom-Elohim was established with two families in February, 2013 as a non-denominational church at the pastor's house. The church was incorporated under the state of California on April 3, 2013, and we obtained our 501 (c)(3) status on May 21, 2015. When the church was established, the pastor, Edwin Guzman, had over 7 years of experience serving as a pastor. He had served as an associate pastor for a Baptist church while also serving as an interim pastor at 2 other churches. By the grace of God, the church grew rapidly; within 1 year, Iglesia Cristiana Shalom-Elohim had to move twice due to space constraints. They are in their 6th year of ministry, and they are once again facing space constraints as they have outgrown their current location.

**Navegando Con Jesús Iglesia Del Pacto  
Torrance, CA**

Average Attendance: 80

**Pastor: Margarita Monsalve**

Navegando Con Jesús Iglesia Del Pacto launched as a Covenant church plant in partnership with the Covenant and PSWC in 2011. The church exists to reach the lost in the city of Torrance. Navegando takes a holistic approach to restoring the individual by introducing him or her to the Gospel of Jesus Christ and providing job skill training.

**La Jornada Covenant Church  
Concord, CA**

Average Attendance: 140

**Pastor: Jorge and Marlen Ramos**

La Jornada Covenant Church launched as a Covenant church plant in partnership with the Covenant and PSWC in 2014 under the leadership of Pastor Fil and Juana Nesta. In 2018, Jorge Ramos was called to be the Pastor. La Jornada is a contemporary bilingual church, serving the Concord community. It is a growing, missional church that launched out of Nueva Esperanza Covenant Church, Antioch.

### **Central Conference**

**New Abbey Covenant Church  
Gurnee, IL**

Average Attendance: 40

**Pastor: EJ Ravago**

While serving as an associate pastor at a Baptist church, Pastor EJ Ravago felt the call and need to plant a church in the town where he'd grown up. After two years of praying and planning,

New Abbey launched its first service in 2016. The church gathers at the local American Legion, which is located between Waukegan and Gurnee, towns that have stark differences. The location of the church is important. A significant part of New Abbey's vision and existence is to navigate all the complexities that shape and divide these communities: race, socio-economic factors, tradition, and perceptions continue to foster barriers. New Abbey hopes to provide a context where true diversity and reconciliation can happen. Their mission is to embody the biblical meaning of the Church. They seek to be a community that believes and is transformed by the gospel, loves God and all people, and pursues justice for the neighborhood and the world. This is their calling.

**Peacemakers Covenant Church**  
**Schaumburg, IL**  
**Pastor: Rev. Choi, Min Ho**

Average attendance: 15

Peacemakers Korean Covenant Church is a community of Korean immigrant Christians whose primary language is Korean. Church membership consists mainly of first-generation Korean immigrants from the 1970's, second-generation Korean immigrants from the 2000's, and third generation Korean-Americans born in the US. On September 9, 2015, three families gathered together to establish the church, calling Rev. Min Ho Choi of the ECC as its senior pastor. In April of 2016, this church merged with Gyu Ja Shee church of the ECC. Peacemakers Korean Covenant Church confesses salvation through faith in Christ alone and aims to bear the fruits of salvation by becoming peacemakers. At present, this church has been in partnership with the Covenant Church of Schaumburg since April of 2018, sharing the same church building.

**Dodam Covenant Church**  
**Niles, IL**  
**Pastor: Sung Ryong Kwak**

Average Attendance: 30

Dodam Covenant Church consists of Korean speaking members whose ages are from early 20s to 70s. The church was launched in early 2006 with a group of about 30 members who were passionate about reaching Korean Americans and others in Chicago and its suburbs. Currently Dodam meets in the facility of a radio station and are looking forward to beginning to share a facility with a Caucasian church in the area in the next few months. The reason Dodam wants to join the ECC is that they are going to need some guidelines for the future of the church theologically, politically, and also in terms of leadership.

**New Vision Covenant Church**  
**Glenview, IL**  
**Pastor: Kwang Sun Cha**

Average Attendance: 125

New Vision Covenant Church started in early 1976 and their desire has been to function as a healthy and Biblical body of Christ. The church's mission is to reach non-Christians and make them disciples of Jesus Christ. New Vision's strategy for local evangelism is to try to plant another Korean American church, with the hope that they will both be able to partner in world missions more effectively. One of their greatest focuses is on the next generation – education and transformation is their goal for young people.

**The Vine Covenant Church**

With only 14% of the Austin community connected to a local congregation, The Vine was initiated to invite people to join us in following Jesus through significant friendship, sacred experiences, and generous compassion. The Vine Covenant Church was founded by two pastors, Mark Charbonneau and Ted Thulin, with an incredible launch team in May of 2016. Over the past three years, The Vine has grown from that original group of 25 to over 200 people attending church each week. Through this community, new people are beginning to follow Jesus; even more are reconstructing a life with Jesus and the church.
